In 2004, Jim would join the JFS board serving from 2004-2012 and then again from 2014-2017. Jim believed in the mission of JFS and it was at that time he included JFS as a beneficiary gift in his will.

It was with great sadness this year that Jim passed away on May 23, 2020. A memorial service was held on July 26th to honor and commemorate his life. In 2000, Jim set up a trust that twenty years later would be used to establish an unrestricted perpetual endowment fund in the amount of \$100,000 to be named The James F. Ellenbogen Memorial Fund.

Jim's goal was to continue to help people even after his passing and to be a part of JFS history forever. May his memory be a blessing.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Jewish Family Service provides confidential, professional counseling services for families, couples, individuals and groups experiencing a variety of problem areas. Treatment areas include addictions, domestic abuse, depression, panic and anxiety disorders and adjustment difficulties. Relationship enhancement skills are also provided to improve communication, parenting, self-esteem and general quality of life. Information and referral to community resources are also offered.

Jewish Family Service is a participating provider with many insurance companies and accepts Medicare and Medicaid. Sliding fee scale is also offered based on family size and income. Our social workers are licensed clinical social workers in the State of Pennsylvania. Jewish Family Service is accredited for outpatient mental health service by the Council on Accreditation.



THE COVID EFFECT by Don Minkoff


When the stay at home and work from home orders occurred, we had to abruptly change from in-person meetings to a telehealth platform. Continuing our work remotely was a new challenge.

With the easing of health privacy and telehealth enforcement under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), that meant we could work from home using Zoom or phone.

It took a short period of adjustment for both the JFS social workers and the clients, but we found that most clients were very receptive and that telehealth was a great option. Clients were able to keep more appointments, continue to work on their goals and feel safe and secure in their own home.

With my long history of working mental health crises, which involves phone intervention, the transition to telehealth has been a relatively smooth one. As in the office, being able to adapt to client's style and needs through the use of telehealth has been effective in continuing the work we do with each client.

FINANCIAL AID & HOLIDAY ASSISTANCE

Short-term financial assistance for rent, utilities, food or other emergency needs is provided for individuals and families experiencing financial difficulties. The Holiday Assistance Program ensures that the beauty of the Jewish Holidays is shared throughout the year.

FAMILY LIFE EDUCATION

JFS offers education and enrichment through lectures, guest speakers and workshops on topics relevant to family life, Jewish identity and current issues. Education and support groups provide educational, supportive, and preventive services to improve emotional well-being, and promote self-sufficiency, personal growth, development, resilience, and wellness.

AGING SERVICES

ADULT GUARDIANSHIP OF PERSON

FS provides comprehensive Guardianship of Person Service to those individuals who have been determined by the court to be incapacitated and no longer able to make their own life decisions. Jewish Family Service's duties as Guardian of Person include making daily decisions about the individual's personal affairs, maximizing his/her right to self-determination, and:

- Asserts the rights and interests of the individual
- · Respects the wishes and preferences of the individual to the greatest extent possible
- Encourages the individual to participate to the maximum extent of his/her abilities in all decisions
- Provides required documentation to the court in a timely fashio
- Visits with the individual once a month and more frequently as needed
- Is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week

JFS is accredited by the Council on Accreditation for Guardianship of Person Service. Referrals may be made by individuals within the community, hospitals, long-term living facilities, physicians, attorneys, the court and social service agencies. Adult Guardianship of Person is a fee for service program. All guardianship fees are reported to and approved by the court. This program is funded, in part, by the Pennsylvania Department of Aging and the Lackawanna County Board of Commissioners through the Lackawanna County Area Agency on Aging.

When COVID19 created the need to work remotely and not gather in the office, it was not so difficult a transition. The hardest part is that the clients I would visit every month in their home, the community, in nursing or personal care homes was not possible any longer. I certainly miss the face to face visits I have with our clients. However, because we live in a time where technology allows us to visit virtually, I can still keep in touch through phone, FaceTime video chats and even Zoom, when facilities are able to accommodate these visits.

Kosher Meals on Wheels has continued throughout the entire pandemic without missing a beat. I am deeply grateful for our volunteers - Sam Flexer, Deborah Fink and Murray Glick who have been delivering meals - and have not missed even one delivery. I also enjoyed being able to fill in for other volunteers including Rick Gelb, Jeff Leventhal and students from B'nos



Yisroel High School when COVID related risks and restrictions unfortunately made it impossible for them to continue volunteering.

Other volunteers (Janet Holland, Marshall Needle and Nancy Post) were not able to deliver meals in person but have kept up their volunteer activity through weekly phone check-ins for clients who don't have family members near by.

OLDER ADULT SERVICES/ CASE MANAGEMENT

The purpose of the Older Adult Program at Jewish Family Service of Northeastern Pennsylvania is to promote and preserve the dignity, self-respect and independence of the individual to the fullest extent possible. The Older Adult Program assists individuals and their families in making choices that foster maximum independence in daily living. Licensed Social Workers and experienced, compassionate volunteers work together to coordinate services for eligible individuals. Consultations are by appointment. Evening hours and home visits are available. Fees for service will be charged according to a set fee or a sliding scale based on family size and income. No one will be denied service because of an inability to pay a fee. JFS is accredited by the Counsel on Accreditation for Case Management. Some services may be covered by your health insurance or Medicare.

JFS VOLUNTEERS ADAPT TO SOCIAL DISTANCING

FS is grateful to our Kosher Meals on Wheels volunteers, who often wear many "hats", for providing support that keeps people safe and healthy. During the 2020 global pandemic, many stepped up to wear many "masks" as they adapted to the COVI-19 pandemic.

JFS volunteers not only deliver nutritious meals, prepared by the Jewish Home of Eastern PA kitchen staff, but as meals are delivered, they provide a wellness check for our clients.

During the pandemic, we found it necessary to modify our deliveries, limiting deliveries to once per week per household, thereby minimizing the risk to our clients as well as to our volunteers. Our volunteers stepped up and have been making telephone check-ins with those clients who have indicated the desire for calls. The phone schedule covers the days when clients would receive meals under normal circumstances and has helped to alleviate social isolation for our clients, which is already a risk, exacerbated by social distancing and other precautions.

DENTALCARE CENTER

he Non-Sectarian DentalCare Center has been part of Jewish Family Service since 1920. This unique service is one of only two such clinics affiliated with a JFS in the United States. Jewish Family Service administers the DentalCare Center in partnership with licensed volunteer dentists from the Scranton District Dental Society and Fortis Institute to provide professional dental services. All treatments are provided in private dental offices with initial examination and diagnosis at Fortis Institute Dental Hygiene Clinic, Scranton. Care includes a complete dental examination, x-rays, prophylaxis, restorations and extractions. Specialized services such as prosthodontics, endodontics, orthodontics, periodontal treatment and oral surgery are also offered at a reduced fee to the client. Residents of Lackawanna County are eligible for services if they are financially unable to afford dental care. Eligibility is determined by a screening and application process completed by Jewish Family Service. The majority of patients receiving dental services have at least one family member employed, is on unemployment, supported by Social Security or Social Security Disability benefits.

FOOD INSECURITY

MAE S. GELB FOOD PANTRY

he Mae S. Gelb Kosher Food Pantry, established in January 2001, was developed to provide assistance with food and other necessary household items to families and individuals during times of significant financial stress. Clients include the elderly who may be isolated and living on a limited income, unemployed adults in need of interim assistance and members of our community who are struggling financially due to difficult family situations or declining health. Clients can make a self-referral to the Kosher Food Pantry or may be referred by family, friends and/or other social service agencies. If a client is known to this agency and receiving services in another program area, their social worker may also refer. An appointment must be made with an agency social worker to complete a Kosher Food Pantry screening form. If determined that the client is eligible for pantry services, the worker will accompany the client to shop in the pantry area. The Food Pantry is supported by donations from the Gelb Foundation, generous community members, synagogues and other Jewish organizations.

FRESH FOOD PANTRY

JFS introduced our Fresh Produce Pantry two years ago. With produce and chickens donated, we were able to provide onions, potatoes, carrots, apples and chickens to those in need during Passover and Rosh Hashanah. The program is an extension of the Mae S. Gelb Food Pantry and our Holiday Assistance program.

KOSHER MEALS ON WHEELS

JFS, in cooperation with the Meals on Wheels Office of Northeastern Pennsylvania and the Jewish Home of Eastern Pennsylvania, delivers kosher meals to those in


need. Kosher Meals on Wheels (KMOW) are available to those people in our community who adhere to Kosher dietary requirements. The program serves those who are temporarily or permanently disabled and who require outside



support in order to function independently at home. Kosher Meals on Wheels provides adequate, well-balanced, home delivered meals to those who are unable to shop for and unable to prepare meals for themselves. The meals are prepared at the Jewish Home of Eastern Pennsylvania under Kosher dietary guidelines. Kosher Meals on Wheels is able to accommodate most special diets, such as diabetic, low salt, low fat, chopped, etc. Recipients are billed monthly for Kosher Meals on Wheels. Funding for meals may be available from the Lackawanna County Area Agency on Aging for senior citizens who have a lower income and meet the required guidelines.


